China, a country of vast resources, developed its metal and iron industry earlier than its western counterparts and achieved great advances in metallurgic science.

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History Of The Chinese Swords. In 1045 BC to 256 BC during the Zhou Dynasty, the Chinese swords commonly appeared as short, single-handed and double-edged straight blades made of bronze. When the Qin Dynasty arrived, the swords were extended and were also developed into two-handed blades.

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The development of swords in China is well documented, and the evolution of the design is clear. The earliest swords from the period were actually made of stone, used in prehistoric times. Then, during the Shang Dynasty (1600 BC to 1046 BC), the first bronze workings led to the development of rudimentary metal weapons.

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Historically, all Chinese swords are classified into two types, jian and dao. Jians are double-edged straight swords while daos are single-edged, and mostly curved from the Song dynasty forward. The jian has been translated at times as a long sword, and the dao a saber or a knife. Bronze jians appeared during the mid-third century BC and switched to wrought iron and steel during the late Warring States period. Other than specialized weapons like the Divided Dao, Chinese swords are usually 70 ...

The Chinese were the first to create swords from high carbon content instead of stainless steel. Their swords were more lean and sharp, unlike the Medieval swords which were heavy and meant for hacking. Their swords are characterized with a single fuller in the middle. Chinese swords are categorized into Jian (dual-edged) and Dao (single-edged).

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Most historians agree that bronze daggers, short swords, and long spearheads were used long before swords and that the true sword (typically defined as a weapon with a blade which is at least twice the length of the handle) did not commonly appear on the Chinese battlefield until the Spring and Autumn period (722-479 BCE).

The evolution of the Dao started in the Bronze age. It was regularly used by the troops until it was replaced, temporarily, by the Jian during the Zhou dynasty of Western China (11th century BC – 771 BC).

Chinese Swords. The Chinese swords are just as old as China and these also have a long history just like the country. Bronze blades have appeared all the way back from the Shang Dynasty as the bronze daggers that have been utilized during that period. The long swords made from bronze appeared during the middle portion of the third century BC and the later Chinese swords were created using steel or iron metals that were wrought, not cast.

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The guard, just below the grip, is in the form of a stylized mask with teeth and fangs, representing a protective deity or guardian figure. Straight double-edged blades of this type are seen more often on Chinese swords, but they were also used in Tibet.

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
